

COMMISSIONERS MEETING – MONDAY, FEBRUARY 10, 2003

Stephen D. Hambley called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. with Sharon A. Ray and Patricia G. Geissman present.

The meeting opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and a Prayer.

Approval of the February 3 minutes was deferred at this time.

Doug King, Administrative Assistant in the County Engineer's Office, presented 3 resolutions approving the vacation of sections of Friendsville Road and White Road in Westfield Township, approving annual assessments on improvements and establishing a public watercourse for Montville Lakes Subdivision Phase 3A in Montville Township, and authorizing the County Engineer to regulate traffic on a section of State Road in Hinckley Township on March 16, 2003. In regards to vacating sections of Friendsville and White Roads, they have been working with relocation of the roads over the last couple years and are now ready to plan the vacations. The regulation of traffic for Hinckley Township is for Buzzard Day. Mrs. Geissman moved to approve the 3 resolutions. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Commissioners reviewed the weekly permits list.

Mr. Hambley asked if there is a TID meeting this week.

Dave Miller, County Engineer, agreed that the meeting is Wednesday at 4:00 p.m.

Chris Jakab, Finance Director, presented and reviewed 12 resolutions involving amending the temporary appropriations, various fund transfers, purchasing fuel for the Engineering Center and the Highway Garage from Weaver Oil, revenue adjustments for Workforce and Family First funds, authorizing an agreement with Chris Ruf for independent contractor services for the Family First Council, approving an internship agreement between County Planning Services and the University of Akron, authorizing release of the escrow account of Allied Construction Group for the Veterans Service Building construction, approving a public official bond for Michael Kovack, Auditor, declaring the necessity of submitting the question of the issuance of Library Improvement Bonds of the Medina County District Library in the aggregate principal amount of \$42,300,000, and the weekly bills in the amount of \$552,162.46. The agreement with Chris Ruf is for the Help Me Grow Program. This gives her a 3% cost of living increase. The internship agreement for Planning Services runs from January 27 through May 24 at a cost of \$2,304.37. The final paperwork has been received from Allied Construction and their escrow account can now be released. There will be a second resolution for the issuance of Library Improvement Bonds next week that will contain the actual millage for the bonds and be filed with the Board of Elections. Mrs. Geissman moved to approve the 11 resolutions and payment of the bills. Seconded by Ms. Ray.

Mike Harris, District Library Director, stated that the Library has been providing services for the past 20 years. During that time the population of the county has increased 40%, the issuance of library cards has increased 300%, and circulation of library materials has increased 450%. The Library Board has considered ways to expand their services to cover the next 20 years of growth in the county. The proposal includes remodeling and expanding the Medina downtown site, remodeling or rebuilding the Brunswick site, constructing new facilities by the Highland Schools and Buckeye Schools, a new site in Lodi, and remodel the facility in Seville. This should meet the expanding needs of the county over the next 20-25 years.

Mr. Hambley noted that there was a *Cheers* in the Gazette regarding the Library Board's decision not to rush back to the ballot with their failed proposal, looked at what the voters had said, and determined to make the downtown site in Medina workable.

Mr. Harris stated that it is a well-conceived plan, and feel that they can get the support they need. They've had tremendous support over the years.

Matthew Gallo asked how much property the Library will take on Washington Street where there are 4 Victorian houses.

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Mr. Harris stated that the Library owns the one property and there is no particular interest in the other 3. Currently the Library is trying to work with the City Schools to get their bus garage property. If they secure that property and use the land that currently has a house they will be able to expand the Library 35,000 square feet of public space.

There was no further discussion.

Roll Call on the motion and second to approve the 11 Finance resolution and to pay the bills showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Gary Berkowitz, Human Resources Director, presented and reviewed the personnel resolution. Mrs. Geissman moved to approve the personnel changes. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

John Stricker, County Administrator, presented 2 change order resolutions. The first change order is for USA Roofing for the County Home slate roof repairs. The original bid was per unit per slate and as some slate was replaced and copper was put in others would break, plus there were 5 areas that badly needed repairs before the slate could be replaced. The amount of the change order is \$22,214. The second change order is for Roetzel Construction for Transit Garage improvements. A wash bay was installed and it was found that curtains are needed around it to contain the water. The amount of this change order is \$2,129. Mrs. Geissman moved to approve both change orders. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Ken Hotz, Sanitary Engineer, presented a resolution accepting and awarding bid for Foskett, Station & Beck Road waterline project. There were 10 bids received last Monday and the low bidder is Medina Excavating for \$1,230,000. Mrs. Geissman moved to accept and award the bid. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Ken noted that the money for this project is borrowed from the OWDA and a portion of the money is to pay for planning assessments for approximately 50 properties in the Western Reserve Water District to pay off their loan. This was also done for Pilgrim Valley extensions.

Ken presented a resolution to except easement for property on Foote Road that backs up to the river. This involves the replacement of the interceptor sewer along Medina reservoir. Mrs. Geissman moved to accept the easement. Seconded by Ms. Ray. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Ken presented a resolution awarding the bid for sludge filter press plates for the Liverpool Wastewater Treatment Plant. This was bid in December and the price from the low bidder was extremely different from the other bids, which raised concern about whether the plates would work appropriately. The company gave them plates to use as a trial and they have worked very well. Mrs. Geissman moved to award the bid for the plates. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Ken presented a resolution creating a restricted water main in Lake Road. He presented a map of the area. When the Westfield Terrace Development was proposed on the east side of Lake Road they had to require a new waterline. The existing 6" waterline was sufficient for what was there, but with the close density in the development it was necessary to extend a 12" line. It was agreed that they could have a restricted waterline so that anyone along that line could connect and pay their share of the cost. Mrs. Geissman moved to approve the restricted water main. Seconded by Ms. Ray.

Mr. Hambley noted that the old line is not being abandoned and that the new line will parallel the old line. He asked if any new parcels will be required to tie into the new line instead of the old line.

Ken agreed that the lines will be parallel. No one will be required to tie on. The existing line was put in by the county to run water to the wastewater treatment plant and there were no assessments. Since that line was put in water was brought in from the southwest and a loop was completed that the 6" line is bottlenecked in the center of it all. A larger line, 12", is needed for

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adequate fire protection. Through questioning, Ken stated that the parcels along Lake Road will have their option of connecting to the 6" or 12". It would be to their advantage to connect to the 12" line.

There was no further discussion.

Roll Call on the motion and second to approve the restricted water main showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Debra Radecky, Office for Older Adults Director, presented a sample of an emergency meal that is used for seniors if they are unable to start meal delivering right away. People that start next Tuesday are being evaluated this week and they would receive one of these meals. The cost was between \$400-\$500 on these. The meals meet the nutritional requirements and will be for those on the waiting list. A new intermittent driver was hired but they are still short one. They have 220 people on home delivered meals this week. Senior Day is being planned for May 20 with a theme to celebrate the Ohio Bicentennial. They have a Wayne College intern that has started. The intern is obtaining an associate degree in social services. The programs for the month include a Valentine's Party on February 14, Anthem Senior Advantage will be in on the 21st, and on the 28th there will be a program called the "Joys of Stress".

Mr. Hambley presented a resolution approving the adoption of the County Home Mission Statement. The County Prosecutor requested a small revision to the statement adopted in November. He read the new statement. Mrs. Geissman moved to adopt the new County Home Mission Statement. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Mr. Hambley presented a resolution appointing Pam Miller as the municipal representative to the Transportation Improvement District (TID). Ms. Miller will be completing the unexpired term of Mike Morse. The term expires December 31, 2003. Mrs. Geissman moved to approve the appointment. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

The Clerk read the resolution to allow expenses of county officials. Mrs. Geissman moved to allow the expenses. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

The meeting was opened for public comment.

Matthew Gallo, Medina Township, asked what will be done if the bond issue doesn't go through for the Library. The timing is bad for this. The levy didn't pass for \$33 million, but this Library has to be in this town.

Mr. Hambley stated that Library Board would review it and make recommendations if the issue fails. The Library Board minutes reflect that they reviewed the other issues that will be on the ballot. There is no good time to put an issue on the ballot. They are planning to make their best case to the voters and this will probably be their last shot at a bond levy for those improvements.

Mr. Gallo asked if they have looked at any alternatives if this doesn't go through, such as a satellite station.

Mr. Hambley stated that an alternative they would have is to look at the communities such as they did in Brunswick. If Lodi wants a new building they could pass their own issue or come up with the money for a building and then lease it to the Library. That is not the option they prefer because they're trying to build one for the whole system particularly in the outlying areas such as York and Granger Townships.

Mr. Gallo stated that they're landlocked in Medina and it would probably cost them more to purchase the remaining properties next to them than it will to construct there.

Mr. Hambley stated that they're developing a memorandum of understanding with the City Board of Education, and the School Board is looking for a better location for their bus

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garage. The intention is to expand the Library's parking with that land, and it would also diminish bus traffic in the downtown area, which would be another benefit.

There was no further public comment.

Mr. Hambley noted that the discussion session is at 1:30 followed by an Executive Session for personnel/disciplinary hearing.

The meeting recessed at 9:26 a.m.

At 1:30 p.m. the Assistant Clerk received bids for sign sheeting and posts for the Highway Department. Bids were received from M.H. Corbin Inc., Judco Inc., Osborn Associates Inc., Hall Signs Inc., Avery Dennis, Flint Trading Inc., Rocal Inc., Vulcan Signs, Kleem Inc. and 3M Company. The bids were turned over to Mark Hartman for the department's review and recommendation.

Commissioners reconvened the meeting at 1:30 p.m. for the discussion session.

Mr. Hambley noted that a Deferred Compensation request was received for partial distribution to an applicant for medical expenses and imminent home foreclosure. The Board needs to determine whether they are in agreement or not. Mrs. Geissman moved that the Board agree with the recommendation. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

Ms. Ray noted that a lawsuit was received regarding the Animal Shelter. She noted that the complainant says he purchased the dog in July 1993. She asked if there isn't a statute of limitations on these.

Bill Thorne, Assistant Prosecutor, stated that he hasn't seen the information.

Mr. Hambley stated that the owner is contending that the Animal Shelter misrepresented the dog's history. He asked if the insurance company would handle this.

John Stricker stated that the individual is suing the county because he was sued because the dog bit someone else. The information about the suit was handed over to Chris Jakab who sends it to the insurance agency.

Chris added that he forwarded a copy to Trina Devanney in the Prosecutor's Office as well.

Mrs. Geissman stated that the Dog Warden wouldn't have a true history of any dog at the Shelter as people dropping them off can say anything.

Bill added that generally there isn't any history on the dogs. He also noted that there is no information on when the dog bite occurred. If it happened in 2000, then the man would have had the dog for 7 years and it would be hard to say the county was liable at all.

Mr. Hambley noted that Sharon Danko had called him a couple weeks ago and he had passed out an email regarding the Medina Initiative, which is essentially an economic development group. Last year the school was sponsoring it, and the group has continued meeting somewhat informally. The idea is for community members to come together, identify problems and solutions to possibly start some grass roots initiatives and develop a community agreement. They've also had participation from the townships. The group would like to have a County Commissioner attend the meetings, and their kick off dinner is scheduled for the 19th with meetings being on subsequent Saturdays.

Mrs. Geissman stated that she has been to some of their meetings and already responded that she's unable to attend the dinner, but that she is interested.

Ms. Ray stated that she will check to see if she can attend and will let Sharon Danko know.

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Mr. Hambley noted that a meeting is schedule for Thursday at 5:30 to bring all of the political jurisdictions together at the Health Department to discuss the West Nile Virus. There was a brief discussion about who the notice was sent to and all Commissioners agreed that they had not seen the notice.

Mr. Hambley stated that he has attended joint meetings by Brunswick Hills Township, Brunswick City and their Chamber. They have been meeting to work on annexation and water issues and also about the possibility of extending the corridor on Routes 42 and 303. He has recommended that they talk with Bill Thorne to see if this can be part of an annexation agreement or not. Bill is the one that both sides were willing to accept opinions from. He noted that the Sokol property may go through as an agreed annexation because it is part of an island. There is a consensus between the Township and City that they can't continue going the way they have been on these issues.

John stated that Jim Gerspacher, representing the Fiber Optics Network group, has requested a meeting with the Commissioners for a presentation of about 45 minutes. After a brief discussion, it was agreed to have him come to the meeting on Tuesday, February 18 either following the morning session or at 1:30.

Ken Hotz noted that at the budget hearing he had recommended adding 2nd and 3rd shifts over the weeks. He presented graphs showing the elevation of the tanks over the weekend and noted that there had been a leak in the new line on Remsen Chase, which affected the elevation. It is important to have someone on at the plants at all times.

Bill Thorne stated that he attended a seminar for townships regarding the NPDES Phase 2 of the Clean Water Act. A lot of township attorneys are taking the position that they have no authority at all on this. They are contending that the EPA rules say "within your legal authority". There is talk about health departments partnering with townships to clean up septic systems and their position is that townships have no obligation, right or ability regarding illicit discharges. Through questioning he stated that where there is illicit discharge into a township ditch they are required to identify it and they are required to pass regulations prohibiting such drainage into their ditches.

Mr. Hambley noted that the Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD) is trying to get a memorandum of understanding with the Health Department for cleaning these up.

Bill stated that should have been dealt with by the Health Department. There's trouble at the state level with this, and a lot of townships are taking the position that they don't have the authority and that they aren't going to partner with or pick up a responsibility they don't need. They will identify illicit discharges and they will prohibit those discharges in their ditches, and they will go to the Health Department or whatever governmental agency has the authority over these. He hasn't seen SWCD's proposal, but he understands a lot of townships are talking partnership and their attorneys are reminding them that they can only do what they legally can. There needs to be legislation on the state and federal levels to give this authority to the townships and counties if that is what they want done. A township can get involved with some through zoning on a particular site and some can be handled through subdivision control, but this isn't a local governments mandate and there are going to be problems.

Mr. Hambley stated that basically the townships or county will pass the problem on to the health departments who are obligated to follow their own rules.

Bill stated that the townships or county are not going to be able to say what the source is. If contaminated water is found in a ditch they can say its coming from a certain discharge point, but it is up to the health department to check it. He agreed that areas with enclosed ditches will be a problem. This is a health department's responsibility, but they don't think they have to go by those standards. Apparently health departments don't feel these standards are necessary. Commissioners need to be aware that if anyone comes in to talk about these things there are 3 questions to keep in mind: 1) do we have any obligation in this field, 2) do we have authority to do anything, and 3) if we don't have 1 or 2, do we want to get involved by partnering with someone that does have the obligation and authority or simply leave it to them. He agreed with Mr. Hambley that the County is still responsible for detection and mapping the discharge into the county drainage system and the County will have to make regulations against illicit discharging.

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If the Health Department then wants to discharge septic systems into a county ditch then the County can say no, that can't be done. Based on the EPA regulations there are at least 800 systems in the county that would be illegal, but under the Health Department regulations there is nothing wrong with them. Some systems are brand new and now they'll have to be told they have to pay between \$6,000 and \$20,000 to re-do them because there are new high tech systems available. He agreed with Ken Hotz that there will be terrain problems as well and some people will have to go with different types of systems that haven't even been approved by the Health Department yet. He said that the question of whether the EPA has authority to change a health department's regulations is a good question. No one is planning to challenge them on that issue although they basically changed their definitions to give them more authority. There was also talk that President Bush may take action to slow or stop the process, but the EPA says they haven't received anything about that.

It was agreed that it is unfair that the Health Department can say something is okay by their regulations and the EPA can say they aren't and then tell the Health Department to enforce it. This is similar to what was done with solid waste except they aren't taking authority away but declaring them illegal and telling the Health Department to enforce it. There are around 3,000 swale systems in the county that have the potential of the EPA saying they have to be redone because they have an illicit discharge under their definition. It was noted that there are 800 systems like this in the urbanized areas now being targeted, but it is anticipated that in the next 6 months to a year the remaining 2200 will be pulled into this. There are people in some areas that don't have that kind of money to spend on their systems. According to the EPA there is a system available for any size lot, no matter how small. The EPA has a list of some high tech expensive systems and the Health Department says some of those are purely experimental.

There was a discussion that a sewer or water district or supplement sewer or water district can be created. One proposal brought up was that if a district is created the district would have authority to impose taxes to raise money to do some of this. It's not likely townships would be interested in this or that it would even be feasible. Bill was not sure how this would work, but it was brought up at the meeting as a possible way to handle this. There is also the 208 Plan that has to be dealt with. There are some areas that sewer extensions are planned for and some areas that can't be extended to. Bill stated that this was brought up as well and they felt that if the Health Department declares septic systems a health hazard they can mandate the county of the sanitary sewer even into areas not planned for extension by using pumping.

Bill stated that he's no sure how some of this can be done legally. IF there are 800 nuisance complaints filed, they aren't going to get done in one year. People aren't going to allow anyone on their property if they know what they're going for and then there will have to be search warrants issued. According to the Health Department this will be very expensive for a lot of people who will not have the financial ability to do this. The option for the Health Department in those cases will be to do the work and then assess the costs to taxes. Although this has been done in other states, there needs to be changes on the state level to grant clear authority. If they didn't skip the governmental entity responsible for that particular problem it would have been better. Townships and counties are not charged with cleaning up the waters of the State of Ohio and there were questions raised at the seminar about whether there was even authority to spend money for this.

Mr. Hambley stated that he will talk with Dave Miller, County Engineer, and Chris Hartman, SWCD, and set up a discussion session in a couple weeks about our part with permits and to review the SWCD plan. He will make sure Bill reviews the plan before Commissioners sign off.

Bill noted that the Health Department hasn't agreed to partner with anybody and they haven't heard anything from the State Health Department on what they should be doing.

The Clerk noted that an appeal was received in today's mail for the Wadsworth Township to Wadsworth City annexation. She understands that she is to get the entire file and minutes turned over to Bill and he will file everything with the court on behalf of the Board.

Bill agreed he will make up a cover and file it with the court. Through discussion he noted that the time frame to get everything filed is 45 days. They asked the Clerk to present everything on behalf of the Board and there is nothing being asked individually. It might be

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advisable for the Board to prepare a formal conclusion of fact to file as well. He agreed the resolution was extensive and the workshop minutes may be enough. He will see if there is a need for a supplement after he receives and reviewed the transcript from the Clerk.

It was also noted that an appeal in the 9th District Court of Appeals was filed regarding the Sharon (Greenhaven) to Wadsworth annexation petition. This was remanded back to the Board by the court and the appeal is requesting a stay. This annexation petition falls under the old laws. If the Court of Appeals allows the stay, the hearing scheduled for February 25 will be cancelled.

Chris Jakab noted that Judge John Lohn, Juvenile/Probate Courts, is unable to be at the February 18 meeting and has requested that his budget hearing be held on the 24th. Commissioners agreed to this change.

There was no further business before the Board for discussion.

At 2:10 p.m. Mrs. Geissman moved to recess into Executive Session for the purpose of Personnel/Disciplinary Hearing. Seconded by Ms. Ray. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.

At 3:19 p.m. Ms. Ray moved to adjourn the meeting. Seconded by Mrs. Geissman. There was no discussion. Roll Call showed all Commissioners voting AYE.
