

William F. Hutson called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. with Stephen D. Hambley and Colleen M. Swedyk present. The meeting was held in the commissioners' hearing room and opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and a prayer.

The minutes of the June 1, 2021 commissioners' meeting were emailed in advance. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the minutes; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

County Engineer Administrative Assistant Dan Becker presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) determining the necessity to close Spieth Road (C.H. 65) between Abbeyville Road (C.H. 47) and Columbia Road (S.R. 252); (2) accepting and awarding the bid for the project known as 2021 Township Pavement Marking Project to install pavement markings on various township roads in Medina County; and (3) accepting and awarding the 2021 Wilbur Road Improvements Project in Granger Township for the Medina County Engineer. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the three resolutions; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

The Medina County Engineer's weekly permits for May 27-June 2, 2021 were reviewed.

Assistant County Administrator Amy Lyon-Galvin presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) amending the appropriations measure resolution; (2) amending the 2021 appropriations resolution by transferring appropriations; (3) expenditure adjustments for various funds; (4) authorizing the county auditor to transfer funds from various county department accounts to the Medina County Software Fund revenue line item; (5) authorizing the county auditor to transfer funds from various county department accounts to the Medina County Print Shop revenue line item; (6) authorizing the purchase of 5,800 gallons of regular unleaded gasoline for the Engineering Center; (7) creation of the Adult Probation Technology Grant fund and authorizing appropriations; (8) acceptance of the American Rescue Plan Local Fiscal Recovery Funds and designation of reporting responsibilities; (9) allowing expenses of county officials; and (10) allowing claims and authorizing issuance upon the treasurer in settlement of such list of claims in the amount of \$1,789,608.35. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the ten resolutions; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. Mr. Hutson noted that the county continues to see the number of gas bids decline. Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that has been the trend, but this time it was effected by the Memorial Day holiday as well. There was no further discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Human Resources Director Holly Muren presented and reviewed a resolution approving the personnel changes for the employees under the jurisdiction of the Medina County Commissioners. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the resolution; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

County Administrator Scott Miller presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) authorizing the leasing of vehicles for the Medina County Maintenance Department and Medina County Sanitary Engineer; and (2) authorizing the County Administrator to approve change orders related to the Medina County Courthouse Project and (3) entering into an agreement with Julie Sipka for master plans examination services for the Medina County Building Department. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the three resolutions; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Job & Family Services Director Debbie Kiley presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) approving an agreement providing service of process pursuant to the requirements of Title IV-D of the Social Security Act; and (2) authorizing an agreement with County Commissioners Association and West Publishing Corporation for Medina County Job & Family Services Child Support Division. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the two resolutions; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Transit Director Shannon Rine presented and reviewed a resolution approving the acceptance of funding from the Federal Transit Authority for the American Rescue Plan Act 2021 Program grants. Mr. Hambley moved to approve the resolution; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. Mr. Hutson asked if there was a time frame in which this money needs to be used. Mr. Rine stated that the FTA has placed a time frame on the money, but the second assistance funding money may be pushed out a little further in order to use the other funding first. The operating money is good for 3-5 years depending on the grant, but this pot may have limits on the funding - we will be careful to use this money first in order to spend it all down. There was no further discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Office for Older Adults Director Laura Toth reported that more seniors are participating in activities at the center. They are complying with current mask orders for unvaccinated persons, and temperature checks remain in place for those wanting to it. Hybrid activities are happening as they are hosting exercise classes and bingo for those at home via Zoom and at the center. They not only have 160 on home delivered meals, but they also have other people in the community that cannot make the drive in and still want to catch a bingo game. They are hopeful that the hybrid activities will continue with the agency to accommodate those individuals. Weekly meetings have begun to discuss the restart of congregate meals in Medina and Brunswick which will take place the week of July 12. The same week they will stop offering home delivered meals to seniors who do not meet the criteria of being homebound; letters will go out next week informing individuals of the changes. Mrs. Toth distributed a chart of the meal deliveries over

the past four years noting the effect of the pandemic on the home delivered meals. The Farmers Market vouchers are coming out soon, and they will be receiving 206 packets worth \$50 each. Vouchers will be mailed this year; next year they plan to require vouchers to be picked up at the center. Curbside meals will continue throughout the summer with events planned for June 23rd, July 14th, August 4th and 25th. Parking lot bingo continues with events hosted on June 14 and 17 in Brunswick. A large scale barbeque event and classic car show is planned for Brunswick in August; no date has been set. In Medina on September 10, they will host another large scale event with entertainment and a farmer's market.

In response to Mr. Hutson's question, Mrs. Toth stated that Senior Day was wonderful. They had 175 cars drive through and 37 vendors participated. She noted that the wait times for the later groups got a little long, but people were overall patient. Mr. Hambley stated that he did not realize that they were doing yoga classes as well as bingo via Zoom; he note that he likes the proposal.

Commissioner Hutson presented and reviewed a resolution proclaiming June 15, 2021 as "World Elder Abuse Awareness Day." Mr. Hambley moved to approve the resolution; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

OSU Extension Service Area Leader Kyle White reported that SNAP Ed is ramping back up in schools with the My Plate Series teaching about healthy eating and their Community Nutrition Program. She noted that they do not report to her office; they are federally funded through a different grant funding source. Her office is open and asking for the public wear a mask, although they are not required to. They are planning for the fair with three camps this year, which include a Kelly's Island Residential Camp (June 29-July 2), a Day Camp for kids 8 years old and older in Spencer (July 6-8) and The Cloverbuds Camp for children 5-8 year olds (June 16-18). She noted that some families did not want to do camps this year and numbers aren't as high as in the past, but that was expected. The Kelly's Island Camp is going to be joined with Lorain County because the lack of counselors available. A drop off box was added to the outside of the office for paperwork so people didn't have to visit the office during office hours only. They are asking any 4-H alumni who are willing to participate to reach to their office – she also asked the commissioners to put an advertisement in the newsletter as well.

Mrs. White stated that they are doing some programs for seniors at the Suprema Center, which include gardening and food preservation topics. They are starting the pesticide and fertilizer applicator training as well as the Master Garden Volunteer Program in July. In Family and Consumer Sciences, they are working with JOG teaching basic financial literacy and parenting classes starting this week. They are partnering with Habitat for Humanity to teach basic financial literacy as well. Real Money Real World is a simulation held in schools which give the kids a made up life and they have to figure out how to make it work. Thanks to Economic Development's introduction to the Economic Development Organization of Lodi and Harrisville Township, they are working on a Community Revitalization Project. The Government Academy this year was done via a hybrid Zoom option. They partnered with Leadership Medina County and had 70 participants who attended 10 classes. They are going to change these classes in 2022 to have a one day all day conference on a Saturday, which will hopefully improve attendance. A STEM Committee was created in the Library because they knew kids were congregating there after school. A Special Interest Club will be launched in July with Let's Make a Difference, and they are going to teach basic sewing skills for 6 weeks.

Mrs. White stated that she is convening the Advisory Committee for Community Development with a broad group of people and asked if the commissioners would be interested in being an advisor and joining them on August 4 from 9 a.m.-11 a.m. at the Bee Conference Culture Center. She would like different perspectives in the community and would appreciate the commissioners to join them. Mr. Hutson asked what the purpose of the meeting is and the objective she is looking to accomplish. Mrs. White explained that they are hoping to come up with ideas for programing and community development in collaboration or as a solo project. They would like to discuss ideas to help the community as well as projects that are working and not working. Mr. Hambley stated that in the past the committee always looked where the gaps were as a supportive role, but this is more of a leadership role that OSU Extension is looking for. Mrs. White stated that the discussion helps bring out areas of improvement for the county and that is what we are looking for. Mrs. Swedyk stated that she would be happy to volunteer for the committee.

Mr. Hambley moved to go into Executive Session after Public Comment and Discussion Session to consider the employment of a public employee; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Public Comment

Mark Fredrick, 6144 W. Smith Rd, Medina, stated that he comes to these meetings to speak up and tell our elected officials what's on his mind. We should have some levity in the hard parts in our life and he hopes he brings that. He wanted to review that you can't do and undo some things. He noted that the county engineer started a feud, but he's kind of done with that other than closing Route 3 as well as West Smith Road which will be closed for 26 days, but at least they are taking care of the roads. He mentioned that he liked the way the vote went down in Medina City with the Courthouse vote. Their figure is \$38M and the opposition's figures are \$60M when you count interest and bond payments; he belongs to the \$60M camp. It's nice to have nice things, but he's not too sure in the middle of a pandemic that we need to jump in over our head. Mr. Fredrick noted the recent loss of a son and daughter of Curtis Perkins; Mr. Perkins has had such a rough time losing his kids. He stated that he recalled the loss of his German Shepard and can't imagine the loss of a son or a daughter. He mentioned problems Mr. Perkins had with Medina Hospital regarding his son and HIPAA laws which resulted in an apology from the president of the hospital.

Mr. Fredrick noted a movie studio project is going to be constructed on approximately 115 acres across the street although it has been delayed due to the current cost of materials. It will include a three-story office building and 120 parking spaces. He stated that elections have consequences and suggested everyone look at the cost of gas and lumber.

Sandra Bilek, 3414 Hamlin Rd., Medina Township, provided and read a written statement to the commissioners regarding the Planning Commission and a letter to the editor she had written to which Mr. Hambley had replied with a letter to The Post. She reminded that a Planning Commission's recommendation to the township is just a recommendation, and the township does not have to follow the recommendation of the Planning Commission. She discussed Mr. Hambley's letter that referenced cases and stated that the majority of cases she has heard about, the Zoning and Comprehensive Plan were upheld. She noted the differences between Limited Business zoning and General Business zoning stating that this is exactly why the citizens of Medina Township are fighting this, as they appropriately and lawfully have the right to do. She referenced Mr. Hambley's statement regarding public agency concerns raised about traffic impact, on-site septic, and lighting being addressed and remedied and stated that perc testing has not been done, traffic impact studies have not been done, and concerns over lighting were not adequately addressed. She stated that Mr. Hambley spoke about Ohio Supreme Court cases involving unreasonable restrictions on permissible uses within commercially zoned properties have been ruled unconstitutional takings and asked if Medina Township's Comprehensive Plan and zoning is unreasonable noting that she does not think so. Mrs. Bilek continued that Mr. Hambley stated "A comprehensive plan, no matter how well intended or representative of the public sentiment at the time of adoption, does not have the legal nor the moral authority to take away someone's property rights without just and fair compensation. That is the law and part of our US constitution." She asked what about a township's legal right and obligation to enact their own Zoning Resolution and Comprehensive Plan? She stated that she believes the staff director's recommendation was the correct one - to disapprove the map amendment for Medina Township. (*Statement and attachments placed on file.*)

Aaron Wirtz, 3233 Hamlin Road, Medina Township, stated that he has reviewed the county's budget for 2021 and as of April, it is anticipated to have a \$10.8M surplus for all of the current expenses for the county. After reviewing the requests from county agencies for funding from the American Rescue Plan Funds, there is a \$63.8M total of requests. He stated that he was in the military and ran a deputies counsel much like the county commissioners where they viewed and approved budgetary requests, and looking through these requests, they probably already see there are a lot of items thrown out there that don't fit with the intent of the American Rescue Plan. He noted that the commissioners previously stated that they are not going to release funds too quickly, but he wanted to say that these monies are to be used for the county and it doesn't mean that all that money needs to be used for county agencies. He noted items he believes to be important for the community including enhanced behavioral and mental health services, job training, loans and education for farmers, public sector revenue loss (case by case basis), and he noted that premium pay for essential workers should be looked at with great scrutiny. Regarding water/sewer/broadband infrastructure, he stated that we do have quite a bit of that in this budget, but does \$34.75M to Medina County Sanitary Engineer make sense? Do we need all those infrastructure projects? Do we need \$12M to the county jail? Is there other means of separating and keeping inmates apart? Mr. Wirtz asked the commissioners to address these issues and not just look at it from the county lens, but from a resident of Medina County lens and being able to look outside the box. He stated we have to expense funds before December 24, 2024 and have to complete construction projects by December 31, 2026. He stated that the commissioners are trusted to come up with the best plan for the community and the county. Mr. Hambley stated that those are all good questions. He noted that the concerns expressed have been on the commissioners' and staff's minds. He thanked Mr. Wirtz for his comments.

Jim Bilek, 3414 Hamlin Road, Medina Township, mentioned Lodi's Joanne Slorgy who was a longtime presenter. He asked if either Commissioner Swedyk or Hutson are residents of Medina Township noting that if not, perhaps they are not aware of the longstanding interest of the Medina Township residents on multiple topics. He stated that he is not sure if either of them have opinions on whether zoning should be changed dramatically to accommodate Sheetz at the historically open space at Route 3 and I-71. He noted that neither of them attended the MCPC meeting and stated that perhaps they had discussions with Commissioner Hambley to represent the entire body's views at that MCPC session. He stated that he'd like to further point out that all the sudden Commissioner Hambley was in attendance at that session with zero attendance by any of the commissioners since the obligatory January kickoff session with all three commissioners back in January. Mr. Bilek stated that he is not sure if Commissioner Hambley has ever met any of the Gerspacher family before that meeting, or talked to them, or perhaps their attorney or the attorney's firm, but he knows that Commissioner Hambley has gotten contributions from Ohio Realtor's PAC in recent years and he must have known the Gerspachers were participants with that entity. He mentioned contributions from the Realtor's PAC, law firms, trucking associations, Spectra, Enbridge and First Energy and stated that apparently Sheetz has Commissioner Hambley's full endorsement, but he's not sure where the other commissioners stand on the matter. He stated that he's curious about Commissioner Hambley's agenda. He noted a movie quote of "you're putting people's lives at risk" and stated that the change with the traffic patterns involving about 5,000 cars a day into Sheetz and those same cars coming out of Sheetz, it's in an already congested interchange. He suggested putting crops in at that intersection instead of a Sheetz gas station.

Mr. Hambley clarified that he voted as a member of the Medina County Planning Commission representing a commissioner. Each commissioner attended the January meeting. All the Medina County Planning Commission meetings have been primarily been remote and have only more recently become in person. It is a meeting that he did have interest in knowing that this was potentially coming up. He stated that any of his views expressed either in the letter or then was never to portray that it was the view of the board, rather it was his view. He stated that he doesn't appreciate ad hominem attacks obviously that have nothing to do with this matter. He reminded that it was a 7-2 vote of various individuals representing other entities of government. Mr. Bilek thanked Commissioner Hambley for the clarification and stated that the vote was 7-2 and none of the voters were from Medina Township.

Mr. Hutson stated that they represent folks across the county and all three commissioners appoint alternates that regularly attend those meetings. He doesn't know specifically now any of them voted, but he agreed with Commissioner Hambley that you have to balance the interests of private property owners and the community as that's required under the law. It is something that whether the community does or not, if they choose to file suit, the judge is going to do it. It is a requirement that the interests be balanced and that you look at the reasonable uses of the property, and if there aren't reasonable uses of the property, it can be an inverse condemnation.

With no further business to come before the Commissioners, the meeting recessed at 10:27 a.m.

Discussion Session

At 10:27 a.m., the Commissioners began the Discussion Session in the commissioners' hearing room.

Land Use Agreement

Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that there was a request made by the contractor working on the State Route 18 project to potentially lease some property owned by the commissioners on the southwest corner of Foote Road and State Route 18. They have proposed language that has been reviewed by the Sanitary Engineer's Office and their request is for the duration of the widening project to place a fence in the back grassy area of the property for an agreed upon lease amount. The land use agreement was provided to ODOT and they have not responded with any objections. We are checking with CORSA to determine any additional coverage is needed for insurance purposes. She requested permission to present the agreement next week for commissioner approval. In response to Mr. Hutson's question, Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that the prosecutor's office is also reviewing the agreement. Mr. Hutson stated that from his perspective, as long as the prosecutor's office has signed off on the agreement, there is a hold harmless and indemnity agreement, and we are named as additional insured on the contractor's policy, he is good with the agreement; Commissioners Hambley and Swedyk agreed.

ARP Scoring Sheets

Mr. Miller stated that he had previously distributed a memo that included with three types of scoring sheets for their consideration. The commissioners discussed three options and determined that to rank projects based on scoring of 1-25 rather than use a weighted system. Mr. Miller noted the seven scoring categories as: 1) permanency of improvement; 2) county department versus other department agency; 3) availability of other funding sources; 4) multi-agency benefit or collaboration; 5) continuing operating costs; 6) impact to community served; and 7) number of residents benefitting or breadth of impact. Mr. Hutson confirmed that projects that do not meet the criteria will not be scored. Mr. Hambley noted that there are still some questions surrounding the distribution of this because of the township issue. Mrs. Swedyk added that Ms. Lyon-Galvin is looking into whether the villages are receiving their own funding.

Design Services

Mr. Miller stated that the state has removed the ability for public entities to have meetings remotely for the time being and he was not sure if it would be put back into the budget. He stated that remote meetings are now part of normal county business and therefore a list was put together of locations that could potentially have public meetings remotely. Mr. Miller asked the commissioners to indicate whether or not they agree with the locations provided and he will return next week to discuss everyone's opinions. Mr. Hutson stated that providing public boards the ability for the public to view meetings online is a benefit to the public even if the members have to be physically present. Mr. Miller stated that there time to discuss options.

Law Library 24 hour access restrictions

Mr. Miller reported that the bushes have removed from the south side of the courthouse and construction of the ramp will begin tomorrow with an expected date of completion on June 18. The following week the security will be moved, so the front entrance will officially be the access to the courthouse; the rear entrance will be locked. Mr. Miller stated that with this underway, he would like to notify the Law Library that they will no longer have 24 hour access to the courthouse. The commissioners agreed that Mr. Miller could send a letter restricting 24 hour access to the Law Library as of June 18.

State Road Change Order & Design Services

Jeremy Sinko stated that next week he would like to present a Fechko change order on State Road; there was a 4,500 foot structure of road between Ridgewood and Hatch on State Road that was planned to be directionally drilled; they ran into rock and can no longer drill. The change order is to deduct the directionally drill pay items and put that money towards an open cut price which is more expensive. In response to Mr. Hambley's question, Mr. Sinko stated that they knew there was rock in the area, but they did not do soil testing which would have informed them that an open cut was necessary. Mr. Sinko stated that another resolution he plans to present next week is approving a contract for design services on water projects.

Animal Shelter Delaying Reopening

Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that the Animal Shelter was scheduled to reopen to the public this week, but after further discussions and due to an uptick in activity, she would like to support Mr. Saffle in opening for appointments only for a short period longer. She confirmed that they are down one person and they are seeing an increase in dog occupancy.

House Bill 294

Mr. Hambley discussed a letter of support for House Bill 294, which is the Ohio Election Security Organization Act. He stated that over the last few years, the Secretary of State has seen many issues and the bill makes recommendations for changes to deal with the administration. He discussed administrative changes that would allow

the Board of Elections more time to complete their work, but still allow early voting hours to remain the same. He noted that the only provision included is an issue involving absentee ballots received in the mail to help reduce the discarding of votes due to errors with the return envelope. In response to Mr. Hutson's question, Mr. Hambley stated that they have time to allow the Medina County Board of Elections to look over the bill before sending the letter of support. Mr. Hutson and Mrs. Swedyk supported Mr. Hambley's request to send a letter of support for House Bill 294 after it is reviewed by the Medina County Board of Elections.

Facility Planning Map Amendment

Mr. Hambley stated a change is coming through that involves prescriptions for water treatment areas; large areas have been defined historically as part of our facility planning area and whether they will have additional sewers within the next 20 years. The county has been trying to come up with a more precise description of what parcels will have access to sewers and it is important to the development community and to the property investors to know where the sewers can go. What this has done is taken out 16,700 acres that would now be onsite systems. The tradeoff of this is allowing another entity, which is the NOACA Board, to determine where you are going to expand your sewers. He noted that historically they have been good to work with, but we would be giving over this governance mechanism. He stated that he has concerns about turning this over to the NOACA board. Mr. Hutson stated that, historically, approvals have been given freely, but he isn't as adverse to it. He noted that the general idea of the state of that they prefer to have areas sewerer rather than on site systems. Mr. Hambley stated that he agreed that is their preference, but the downside to this is increase density or residential use.

Ms. Lyon-Galvin explained that there is a significant area that is being demonstrated as being removed because it can't be served by gravity. This prescription amendment also has some areas that are being converted from green to pink and some that are being memorialized as being sewer for projects that are in the works. If you compare the current map to the proposed map, you can see additional pink areas as well as memorializing those works to be sewerer because after this change, the EPA will not approve those improvement plans to allow those developments to move forward. She confirmed that the difference between the current prescriptions and the proposed prescriptions is that those areas cannot be served by gravity. This is meant to be more transparent for those investors who are buying property in the county to show them properties more readily served with utilities.

In response to Mr. Hutson's question, Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that avoiding lift stations is a long standing policy in the rules and regulations of the Sanitary Engineering Department. She explained that developers who run into challenging topography and need a separate pump station say that the homeowners association will maintain the pump station, but that only works if the HOA is still in business. She noted that those pump stations will be turned over to the county for maintenance in those cases. Mr. Hambley stated that if Medina County would have allowed pump station anywhere, it would have blown up the county in growth. Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that she agreed and noted that it does not preclude development because they have the opportunity for an onsite system. Mr. Hambley stated that he is aware that they are getting some development areas by going this route, but the gravity of this is giving NOACA the authority over the 16,700 acres of land. It does make it more clear for developers and land owners to see where they potentially can have sewers or not, which is a benefit. In response to Mr. Hutson's question, Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that they try to update the map every five years. She added that 99.9% of the time requests are mutually agreeable, but there is a chance for dispute between local and state governments. Mr. Hutson stated that he understands Mr. Hambley's concern. Mrs. Swedyk stated that it seems like it has been standard procedure to have the Sanitary Engineer's Department submit requests to NOACA. The commissioners agreed to table the topic to investigate it more.

Long Range Transportation Plan Comments

In response to Mr. Hambley's question, Mr. Hutson stated that he had not seen the comments from Bethany Dentler on the final LRTP. Mr. Hutson mentioned that he looked at the plan and it did not seem to have changed much at all. He stated that he still has concerns with the plan and asked the other two commissioners if they would like to support the plan or not. Mrs. Swedyk and Mr. Hambley stated that they would not like to support the plan in its current state; Mr. Hutson agreed.

Executive Session

At 11:16 a.m., the Commissioners went into the Executive Session that had been voted on earlier. The Executive Session ended at 11:50 a.m.

Adjournment

Mr. Hambley moved to adjourn the meeting; Mrs. Swedyk seconded the motion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 11:50 a.m.
