

Stephen D. Hambley called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. with William F. Hutson and Colleen M. Swedyk present. The meeting was held in the commissioners' hearing room and opened with the Pledge of Allegiance and a prayer.

### Approval of Minutes

The minutes of the May 17, 2022 commissioners' meeting were emailed in advance. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the minutes; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried. The minutes will be placed on file as distributed.

### Special Guest

*Brunswick Fire Chief Greg Glaumer* stated that the City of Brunswick lost Firefighter Ron Novak in the line of duty in 1969; many firefighters at his station did not even know this had occurred. The Medina County Fire Chiefs' Association is putting on a memorial service on June 18 at 10:00 a.m. at Brunswick Fire Station #1 where a monument will be dedicated. This will honor all firefighters in the county that have died in the line of duty. This will be a yearly event with the event being held in a different community each year. The commissioners will include the event flyer in their next newsletter.

### Public Comment regarding pending resolutions

*Mark Fredrick, 6146 W. Smith Rd., Medina* stated that over the years, he has discussed the Nexus monies which never materialized, the garbage contract, the new courthouse, and the mailboxes. He stated that on the agenda is radioactive waste being dumped in our county. He stated that beet juice sticks to the road and when it kicks up under your tires, it also sticks to the bottom of your cars. He stated that with Commissioner Swedyk being up for reelection, it would be a real bad thing if somebody put a billboard up in their yard like he did years ago when he got a judge un-re-elected. He mentioned that the salt in the brine sticks to the brake lines and corrodes them. Not only are you killing the population, you're destroying our property. He stated that he hasn't done his homework yet, but there are others here who have done their homework and he appreciates their effort. With the radioactive pollution, once we pollute our air, it's gone. He then spoke of water issues in California, famine and the avian flu. He stated that there is a resolution coming up and none of this toxic brine waste dumped anywhere in our county.

Mr. Hambley stated that he provided Mr. Fredrick wide latitude, but there are no pending resolutions regarding his topic. Mr. Fredrick stated that he thought it was on a resolution today.

### Resolutions

*Highway Engineer Administrative Assistant Dan Becker* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) determining the necessity to close Blake Road (C.H. 118) between Yoder Road (C.H. 105) and Tower Road (C.H. 55); (2) determining the necessity to close Old Weymouth Road (C.H. 32) between Nichols Road (C.H. 131) and Remsen Road (C.H. 37); and (3) accepting and awarding the bid for the project known as 2022 Township Pavement Marking Project to install pavement markings on various township road in Medina County. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the three resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

The commissioners reviewed the permits issued May 12-18, 2022.

*Sanitary Engineer Jeremy Sinko* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) authorizing the Sanitary Engineer to enter into an agreement with Jones and Henry Engineers for professional design services to install a permanent generator at the Westfield Road Well; and (2) authorizing the transfer of funds between various Sanitary Engineer funds and county funds. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the two resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

*Human Resources Director Holly Muren* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) approving wage increases for employees of the Medina County Child Support Enforcement Agency; and (2) approving personnel changes for the employees under the jurisdiction of the Medina County Commissioners. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the two resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

*County Administrator Scott Miller* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) authorizing the execution of a Stop Loss Agreement and Addendum with Medical Mutual of Ohio for the provision of employee health plan services; (2) authorizing a request for proposals for consulting services for designing and implementing a Microsoft active directory infrastructure; (3) approving an agreement for employee health benefit plan consultant services; and (4) approving an agreement with Team Dynamix IT Service Management Software (ITSM). Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the four resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. Mr. Hutson inquired of the implementation timeline for the active directory infrastructure. Mr. Miller stated that that goal is the end of the year. There was no further discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

*Assistant County Administrator Amy Lyon-Galvin* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) amending the appropriation measure resolution; (2) amending the 2022 appropriations measure resolution by transferring appropriations; (3) cash transfer for various funds; (4) approving the submission of the FY 2023 Felony Delinquent Care/Reclaim Grant application; (5) creation of the JFS Foster care Recruitment & Retention Fund 0052 and authorizing appropriations; (6) creation of the DTF Medina County Drug Task Force Fund 5024 and authorizing appropriations; (7) creation of the Sheriff's Motorcycle Safety Grant fund and authorizing appropriations; (8)

creation of the Sheriff's Recruitment Technology Upgrades fund and authorizing appropriations; (9) approving the Medina County Drug Advisory Committee (MCDAC) Grant funding for fiscal year 2022-2023; (10) authorizing the reimbursement of Covid-19 medical expenses to the County's self-insured health care fund with Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Fund as established under the American Rescue Plan Act; (11) allowing expenses of county officials; and (12) allowing claims and authorizing issuance upon the treasurer in settlement of such list of claims in the amount of \$2,834,331.14. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the twelve resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. Mrs. Swedyk stated that the MCDAC distribution follows the guidelines with the priority given to the Drug Task Force and then the school resource officers. There was no further discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

### **Department Updates**

*Transit Director Shannon Rine* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) approving donation of a Braun mobility device lift from Medina Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW 5137) to Medina County Public Transit; (2) approving a contract with the Greater Cleveland Regional Transit Authority and the Medina County Commissioners; and (3) approving the submission of an application with the Federal Transit Administration for Urban Area Formula grant programs. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the three resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Mr. Rine reported that their fixed route ridership is down about 1,000 trips on average for the month of April. They had 44 demand service trips denials which are mostly during their peak times. With their strategic planning, they are looking at what they can do to be more flexible. They are in the midst of their national transit database reporting for 2021 and they are planning their 2018-2021 FTA Triennial Review which will be a four year review due to the pandemic. The bus shelter at the Human Services Center will officially open May 31. He read excerpts from a letter received from Jeff Murrin expressing gratitude for the great service provided by Medina County Public Transit to his father. There was brief discussion regarding potential initiatives aimed at increasing ridership.

*Job & Family Services Director Debbie Kiley* presented and reviewed the following resolutions: (1) authorizing an agreement for Comprehensive Case Management Program (CCMEP) between Medina County Department of Job and Family Services and Tri-County Jobs for Ohio's Graduates; and (2) authorizing contracts for substitute care of children for Medina County Job and Family Services. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the two resolutions; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

Ms. Kiley stated that SNAP recipients remains at about 9,400 issuing \$2.3M in benefits. There are approximately 380 TANF participants issuing about \$90,000 and they are maintaining approximately 26,000 Medicaid recipients. The Child Protective Division received a Foster Care Recruitment Grant in about \$20,000; next year they will receive more than \$200,000. They will be able to access these funds to purchase foster care and adoption software. They will include some outreach events in partnership with medical professionals, teachers and school staff. Trauma training will be provided for current and new foster families. As their foster family population has increased 40% in 2022, there is still a great need. The Child Protective Division has managed over 240 calls in April; there are 119 children in care currently with 19 in facilities or institutional care. The agency currently has 56 foster homes. The division is hosting its Foster Parent Appreciation on Thursday. The Child Support Division collected about \$1.6M in current support and over \$1.5M in past due payments. She stated that in partnership with Ohio's Kinship and Adoption Navigator Program, a legal bus tour will be held on June 24 in their parking lot. It will have attorneys on the bus that are not involved with Job & Family Services, but are taking on children that aren't their own. This legal bus is more of an opportunity for the community to help those children without Job & Family Services getting involved as they are the agency of last resort.

*David Corrado, Medina County Fiber Network*, reported that they are moving further into the Medina residential area and should be running around 15 crews within the next 30 days. The challenge has been resources and trying to find enough crews to keep the construction moving. They are approximately within 2 ½ months to hit the 1000<sup>th</sup> connection and they have increased the sales force for residential fiber to assist people with learning about the new technology and how to leverage technology over the fiber. They have addressed two areas – one with digital literacy to assist Medina County residents with understanding how to leverage technology, and one with Affordable Care which is a federally-funded program in which the network becomes certified in providing services at a certain price point. Mr. Corrado mentioned that they have a telehealth application (Doc-to-Go) which is a supported service through MetroHealth. This will be a monthly subscription that will provide immediate video calls with a doctor and will be unlimited; it is only available through Medina County Fiber Network.

Mr. Hambley noted that Mr. Corrado has been participating along with LIT Communities in the Digital Inclusion Literacy initiative which is a partnership with not only Medina County Fiber but also with the library, Office for Older Adults and the Career Center to expand the program in working with various populations for being able to utilize their broadband when they get it. He appreciates LIT Communities and Medina County Fiber for their participation and looking outside the box as to how to help people utilize it. Mr. Corrado added that they are in design mode right now for ARPA Sections 1 (the far west area of Medina County in partnership with LMRE) & 2 (the Guilford Township area.) These two areas have a 24 month time limit according to ARPA regulations.

### **Commissioners Resolutions**

*Commissioner Hambley* presented and reviewed a resolution commending Karen Bennett for her years of service with Medina County Job & Family Services. Mrs. Swedyk moved to approve the resolution; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried.

## Public Comment

*Kathie Jones, 2606 Hidden Spring Lane, Wadsworth*, noted that the commissioners haven't signed a resolution opposing the House and Senate bills on the radioactive brine as a commodity. She distributed petitions signed by more than 100 individuals stating they wish the commissioners to do so. She also distributed an article dated May 29, 1985 where Medina County Commissioners voted to not allow brine on the roads in Medina County or on private residences because of the fear that it would be contaminating water and ruining the health of individuals. She stated that it's a shame that the current commissioners refuse to reaffirm the vote from 37 years ago. There is no question that this brine is radioactive and will poison water wells and cause cancer and other health problems to individuals in Medina County. She stated that by not signing the resolutions stating opposition to these bills, the commissioners are not upholding their oath of office to protect the health and people of Medina County. She further stated that the commissioners did not protect them from the Nexus pipeline and compressor station, and mentioned that they had requested public meetings with EMA to learn about blowdowns and for Nexus to provide at least 48 hours' notice of blowdowns. She again requested the commissioners to sign a resolution opposing the bills as the Athens County Commissioners have done.

*Pauline Chapman, 7328 Wooster Pike Rd., Seville*, stated that she is a three year cancer survivor and is concerned about this issue because she has to walk across the road that brine is spread upon to get her mail, has to stand on the side of the road to weed whack, and her water well is within 135 feet of where that brine is going to be flowing into the ditch. She stated that she has read about all the toxins that are in that brine and asked the commissioners to sign the resolution to not have that spread on her roadway.

*Carol Brenstuhl, Montville Township*, stated that she was here about a month ago and was told the commissioners would research it and was very surprised there was no response from any of the commissioners stating they had done the research. She stated that the commissioners in 1985 stated that they were continuously fighting in the county for the underground disposal of brine to not be done. She stated that she is concerned because where she lives, there is a stream that feeds into the Rocky River, and she is disappointed that the commissioners haven't done their job and researched this.

Commissioner Hutson asked Ms. Brenstuhl what agency in Medina County currently uses oil and gas brine for the roads. Ms. Brenstuhl answered that is what they want to do. Mr. Hutson again asked what agency, governmental or otherwise, uses oil and gas brine on roads in Medina County. Ms. Brenstuhl stated that 37 years ago, Medina Supply wanted to as did an oil driller from Liverpool Township. Mrs. Swedyk noted that the commissioners did do research. Mr. Hutson again asked Ms. Brenstuhl who is doing it; Ms. Brenstuhl answered that there are none currently using it. Mr. Hutson stated that there are no governmental agencies in Medina County, township, village or city that intends to use brine. Ms. Brenstuhl stated this is a state issue. Mr. Hutson stated that ODOT in Medina County does not use it, Medina County does not use it, as far as they have been able to determine, because they have done the research, no townships, villages or cities in Medina County are using it. ODOT actually mixes their own salt and water combination to spread on the roads; it is not oil and gas and it is not radioactive. They have stopped using AquaSalina in Medina County and it is being phased out across the state. Mr. Hutson mentioned that he takes some issue with Ms. Jones' comments of the harms of Nexus because he has actually been out to the compressor station when they have had a blowdown so he could observe it; it is a quite unremarkable event. When they have an emergency blowdown, it's not even possible to give 48 hours' notice and to his knowledge, they haven't even had an emergency blowdown. It is an event that is allowed by the EPA and is controlled. He has personally spoken to ODOT and read various articles on this issue, and it is his understanding that it is not a significant issue in the State of Ohio. (*Ms. Jones interjections inaudible due to not being at podium.*)

Mr. Hambley reminded that the point of this public comment is to receive public comment; the commissioners have latitude to respond. This is a public meeting and the commissioners have listened to the accusations and he thinks many of the statements are not factual although presented as factual and are biased. He stated that Commissioner Swedyk reported a couple of weeks ago about her discussions and her investigation. Each commissioner has taken this issue seriously, have evaluated it, have conferred with a number of agencies and entities, and have looked at a number of the concerns with this. He noted that he thinks their presentations are mixing up the brine issue with those two bills that are pending, which are not even scheduled for hearings, they have overwhelming opposition and each of those bills only have two proponents. He stated that he is already on record publicly and there as being personally opposed to those two bills. He suggested that there is still a lot further to go at the state level before those bills are going to see action. There is no doubt in his mind that these are serious issues, but they have been evaluated and a number of credible individuals and agencies have come out in opposition of those two bills. He stated that he

takes offense that they are mixing up the two issues regarding the use of the brine. The resolution that was passed, he was unaware of that and they will research it. Even the article itself provided by Ms. Jones pointed out it only applied to county roads, it didn't apply to township roads. This is an issue that certainly the commissioners acted on and would have supported their approach to this. The commissioners are doing their homework and evaluating this. When it comes to the use of brine, Commissioner Swedyk and Commissioner Hutson have already indicated publicly that we are not using oil waste for brine on our roads in Medina County. Ms. Jones stated that she mentioned that these bills are about making it a commodity so anybody can spread it anywhere, and people from Medina County go into other counties and bring it back here on their cars. She made a comment regarding the commissioners being "in the pocket of the oil & gas industry." Mr. Hambley stated that her characterization is inappropriate.

*Carol Brenstuhl* returned to the podium and stated that if she came across accusing, she was only trying to get answers. She stated that she's concerned because she is on a county road. She asked why the commissioners can't just sign a resolution and send it to the state.

*Pauline Chapman* noted that she knows a lot about pipeline failures based on previous employment. She stated that she is within 300 feet of the Nexus pipeline and was very sad that nobody tried to keep that out of our county. Ms. Jones stated that she lives within 2.85 miles of the Wadsworth compressor station and they know of the toxins coming out of there because they have infrared cameras showing the toxins coming out and they are monitoring it through Sustainable Medina County.

*Kathy Menditto, 158 Highgate Dr., Wadsworth*, stated that she agreed that their purpose for coming here today was to ask the commissioners to sign the bill. The commissioners have stated that they have done their research and they are opposed to the bills, so what's the harm in publicly saying they are opposed to them. She stated that her concerns are about the high levels of radiation in oil & gas brine. Even if it's not currently being used on our roads, it could be if this gets passed. The brine has been found to be highly radioactive and cancer-causing. She noted that she is a breast cancer survivor. The chemicals will get into our soil and water and will stay there for up to 1,600 years. As a mother and grandmother, she wants to protect them and other residents here, and asked the commissioners to sign the resolution opposing these two bills.

With no further business to come before the Commissioners, the meeting recessed at 10:37 a.m.

#### **Discussion Session**

At 10:37 a.m., the Commissioners began the Discussion Session in the Commissioners' Hearing Room.

#### Courthouse Update

Scott Miller reported that they have relocated the bathrooms from the third floor of the 1841 courthouse to the connector reducing the cost significantly. The contingency is back up to more than \$500,000.

#### Solid Waste District Inbound Scales

Jeremy Sinko reported that the new inbound scale has been installed and reopened Monday mid-morning.

#### Rumpke Commercial Mixed Waste Contract

Mr. Sinko discussed the Rumpke's contract noting that in the original contract, Rumpke was to hit a 5% recovery on the commercial mixed waste and have been averaging about 1.4%, 1.3% and 1.2% respectively over the last three years. There were discussions with Rumpke and the Solid Waste Policy Committee regarding possible contract amendments. There were four main points addressed in a change in terms including:

- \$2.00 reduction in transport, transfer and disposal costs
- Eliminate the single stream recycling fee
- Lease of portion of 8730 Lake Road to Rumpke
- Rumpke would turn that into a single stream recycling facility allowing them opportunity to bring in material from outside of the county

Mr. Sinko stated that the Solid Waste Policy Committee is in favor of the transition to single stream recycling. The prosecutor's office and outside legal counsel helped amend the contract language with Rumpke; both sides approve of the contract language. He would like to present this to the commissioners on June 7 for approval. Mr. Sinko agreed to provide the commissioner a copy of the amended contract for review.

Mr. Hutson explained that this has been under discussion for close to two years. When Covid hit, it changed the composition of the various waste streams, so we worked with Rumpke for several months trying to see what was going to happen in terms of the recycling percentages. As time went on, everyone concluded that this was not going to improve. In looking at alternatives, they asked ways that Rumpke could use that equipment and generate more recycling for the county overall. Mr. Sinko noted that it is in the Solid Waste Plan to reevaluate this commercial mixed waste processing each year to make sure it was sustainable. In answer to a question by Mrs. Swedyk, Mr. Sinko stated that there have been one or two townships that have shown interest in curbside recycling. There was brief discussion regarding grants to assist with costs for implementing curbside recycling. After discussion, the commissioners agreed that Mr. Sinko may move forward with a resolution.

#### LEAD Program

Amy Lyon-Galvin stated that based on conversations and feedback from some of the department directors, at least 21 employees have been identified as candidates for the LEAD Program offered by Leadership Medina County. A 12-month program has been put together for 24 individuals. The costs associated with bringing in a speaker gets

spread out over a larger group rather than having the costs significantly higher for a smaller group. The proposed program is a once a month series and cover a variety of topics. Because the program as outlined begins in July and carries on through June 2023, she was hoping to have some discussion and decision as to whether the commissioners are interested in pursuing, and to determine if the cost can be spread over two years. She noted that some type of community service program is included which is a valued piece as it is an opportunity to give back.

Mr. Hutson stated that he is in support of it and asked if this is limited to commissioners' departments. Ms. Lyon-Galvin stated that based on the overwhelming response from the commissioners' departments, all slots for this first round will be filled. If this works, it would be great to open it up to the other elected. Mrs. Swedyk stated that she is supportive of this. Mr. Hambley stated that since he is on the board for Leadership Medina County, he will not be involved in the decision and will abstain. Ms. Lyon-Galvin will present a resolution next week. Mrs. Swedyk stated that this program should be evaluated after the first year.

#### NOACA

Commissioner Hutson stated that there is a NOACA meeting scheduled for June 3 to discuss the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy that NOACA is developing as a region. Bethany Dentler, Kathy Breitenbucher and he will be on that call. The first draft is not much different from the Long Range Plan draft, so they will work to change that. It will be on the June 10 Board agenda. Armond Budish also expressed concerns about it at the Executive Board meeting. Mrs. Dentler provided feedback to the consulting firm last week. Mr. Hambley stated that he was very glad she devoted the time to this; Mrs. Swedyk agreed.

Mr. Hutson also noted that there is a significant amount of transportation dollars coming from the federal government. NOACA is pushing for a greater AMTRAK presence not only through Ohio, but also in Ohio such as a Cleveland-Columbus-Cincinnati corridor. It is unfortunate that we have a region such as ours that only has one train go through each day.

*Commissioner Swedyk* moved to go into Executive Session following Discussion Session to consider the compensation of a public employee and discuss imminent litigation; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried. The meeting recessed at 10:56 a.m.

#### **Executive Session**

At 10:56 a.m., the Commissioners went into the Executive Session. The Executive Session ended at 11:34 a.m.

#### **Adjournment**

Mrs. Swedyk moved to adjourn the meeting; Mr. Hutson seconded the motion. There was no discussion. Roll call showed all commissioners voting AYE; the motion carried. The meeting adjourned at 11:34 a.m.
